Concrete results have been achieved

- Seen an increase in unionization within ship breaking
- Seen better working conditions within ship breaking, especially in India
- Seen the Hong Kong Convention from 2009 for the safe and sound recycling of ships being ratified in some countries and last year EU approved the proposal dictating increased responsibility in scrapping for EU-flagged ships

But looking forward a lot still has to be done ...

Major challenges in a global context

- Getting growth back on track is the most urgent task in front of us
- Promote a sustainable industrial policy
- Stop the significant rise in precarious work
- Promote labor and safety regulations
- Getting climate change back on the agenda
